Brooke and her classmates at Thornton Academy are just a handful of the many students and adults involved with Best Buddies Maine, a local nonprofit dedicated to fostering friendships, promoting inclusion, and empowering individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD) to lead fulfilling lives and connect with their communities.

BBME is a subsect of Best Buddies International®, founded in 1989 by Anthony K. Shriver at Georgetown University. Today, Best Buddies' formal pillars — One-to-One Friendships, Leadership Development, Assisted Employment, Inclusive Living, and Family Support — engage participants in each of the 50 states and 56 countries and territories, positively impacting the lives of over 1.3 million people with and without disabilities around the world. In many cases, as a result of their involvement with Best Buddies, people with intellectual and developmental disabilities secure rewarding jobs, live independently, become inspirational leaders, and build lifelong friendships.

Best Buddies only recently found its way to Maine, but its impact in the past few years has already been visible and long-lasting. At the core of BBME is its Friendship program, a transformative initiative that encourages interaction between people with and without disabilities. Through carefully curated matches based on shared interests and compatibility, the program creates opportunities for genuine connections to blossom. These friendships extend beyond surface-level interactions, providing buddies with a sense of belonging, support, and camaraderie

Currently, Best Buddies Maine has 43 school friendship chapters for students ranging from elementary to collegiate, as well as 4 "Citizens" chapters for adults, community members, and corporate volunteers. These chapters meet regularly and pair their members in friendship matches as they present themselves, as well as participate in several statewide Best Buddies events like the Friendship Walks in Portland and Bangor, the annual Hyannis Port Challenge, and the Best Buddies Leadership Conference at Indiana University. Maine also has an active Ambassadors program that offers leadership training and public speaking opportunities for people from and supporting the IDD community, encouraging people to share their stories with disability and why inclusion is important to them. As the organization continues to grow year after year, BBME is excitedly working towards expanding its offerings to include the rest of the BBI pillars, mainly Transitions and Assisted Employment services, in the near future.

Behind the success of Best Buddies Maine is a dedicated team of staff, volunteers, and supporters who are passionate about making a difference. From program managers and faculty advisors who facilitate buddy matches to volunteers who lend their time and expertise, everyone plays a vital role in advancing the organization's mission.

131st Legislature Highlights

The ASM Legislative Committee spent time during this session working toward developing a process for reviewing and tracking bills of import to the ASM, its members, and all impacted by legislation and policy related to autism. We instituted a tracking system, and increased our capacity to stay informed with respect to bills being monitored by groups with shared and/or overlapping interests including the <u>Consumer Council System of Maine (CCSM)</u>, <u>Disability Rights Maine (DRM)</u>, and the <u>Maine Coalition for Housing and Quality Services (CHQS)</u> as tracked by the <u>Maine Association for Community Service Providers (MACSP)</u>. I participate on the CCSM Legislative and Issues Committees and regularly attend the CHQS meetings. The ASM Legislative Committee, on behalf of the Board, hopes to build on such relationships during the upcoming 132nd Legislature which will convene for its first session in January 2025 (following Fall elections).

During the session which concluded this past April, the ASM Legislative Committee monitored a number of bills; testifying on two. Written testimony was submitted neither for nor against LD 345 An Act Regarding Educational Policies and Programs – renamed and funded as <u>An Act to Transition</u> the Responsibility for Child Find and for ensuring a Free, <u>Appropriate Public Education for Eligible</u> <u>Children from the Child Development Services System to School Administrative Units</u>. The ASM's and other constituent input was well reflected in the final (renamed) version of LD 345 which provided the language and funding criteria as adopted in the updated State budget.

For LD 2166 An Act to Establish a Grant Program to Increase Postsecondary Educational Opportunities for Students with Intellectual or Developmental Disabilities or Autism Spectrum Disorder, written testimony was submitted in favor. While LD 2166 was well supported and passed, it never moved on for funding and so "died" without becoming law. Many interested parties likely will renew a process to seek passage of such legislation in the upcoming 132nd Legislature. Additionally, my position on the Lifespan Waiver Development Stakeholder Group and membership on the Maine Developmental Services Oversight and Advisory Board (MDS OAB) allowed for ongoing input to discussions related to the Lifespan Waiver development process – introduced in the 131st Legislature as LD 659 An Act to Promote Seamless and Flexible Home and Community Supports Across the Lifespan for Individuals with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities or Autism, and ultimately incorporated into and funded by the updated State budget.

Additional highlights from the 131st Legislature are reflected in other components of the updated State budget.

DHHS -

- funding to continue 125%/AAAA initiative for Direct Care Service rates and annual COLA for rates that have not been adjusted under the new Rate Setting System
- allocated dollars to clear the Section 29 waitlist by June of 2025, and additional money to support people on Section 21 waitlist (level 1)

DOE/CDS -

- allocations to support the 55% state funding for K 12 education
- funding requirements for ed techs and other school support staff to increase pay by establishing a base minimum wage
- a funding plan over 2 years for additional preschool programming to "bring Maine into compliance with IDEA"
- one-time funding to Child Development Services (CDS) in Fiscal Year 2024 to pay for the educational services provided by special purpose preschools while the Department of Education (DOE) establishes a daily rate for the 2024-2025 school year

Other -

- establishment of an Office of Violence Prevention
- additional Crisis Receiving Centers in Lewiston, Penobscot county, and Aroostook county modeled off the evidenced-based model piloted in Portland; and direction for the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) to proceed with a plan to create a statewide network of such centers
- funding for Mobile Crisis Support Teams

As developments with all of the State budget components and related initiatives/expansions move forward, the ASM Legislative Committee will need to monitor the outcomes of the CDS transition as well as the capacity/effectiveness of the Receiving Centers and (Mobile) Crisis Response services to meet the needs of autistic individuals. The Committee also is preparing to work collaboratively to draft a proposal and seek legislative sponsor(s) for a bill related to Medicaid (MaineCare) funding of safety items.

With the start of a new Legislature, it will be a fast-paced and busy period from January – June 2015 so...stay tuned.


