Annual Meeting

The coronavirus pandemic has created immeasurable challenges for us all, and like so many events this year, our annual meeting on September 25th was virtual to ensure everyone's safety.



Guest Speaker, Dr. Matthew Siegel, *Vice President of Medical Affairs for the Developmental Disorders Service of Maine Behavioral Healthcare*, introduced the progress of the new "Center of Excellence in Autism & Developmental Disorders" treatment, training and research facility currently being built on the grounds of Spring Harbor Hospital in Westbrook. Dr. Siegal explained the services it will offer for up to 700 adult and pediatric patients with intellectual disabilities. This project is a \$14.7 million, 28,000 square foot state-of-the-art facility created to meet the growing needs of Maine families and individuals with a diagnosis of autism and other developmental disorders is due to open in the summer of 2021. Building Communication And Independence For Children Across The Autism Spectrum

Strategies to Address Minimal Language, Echolalia and Behavior Elizabeth Ives Field

This book supports professionals and families by providing detailed practical intervention to address goals in communication, independence, and behavioral interactions for a wide variety of children with autism. The major premise is that all children, regardless of their abilities, should be helped to maximize their personal potential for safe, happy productive lives.

Most of the book lays out specific procedures to overcome obstacles that frequently interfere with successful interactions. Three interspersed chapters expand on the key, evidence-based, instructional methods, and describe other important skills to teach, with commentary on behavior tracking progress, generalization, and modifications for adults.

Nine children at various severity levels of the autism spectrum, from preschool to high school age, illustrate many characteristics of autism. Multiple goals included foe each child focus on skills that are developmentally appropriate, functional in daily life, and foundations for future progress.

Among other topics, the goals and teaching methods focus on:

- Transitioning from a three-dimensional object system to picture-based communication.
- Establishing cooperation and joint attention in structured teaching or play-based sessions
- Developing basic reseptive and expressive spoken language
- Replacing echolalia with more conventional requests, comments, greetings, protests, answers and questions
- Supporting group participation, conversation, and peer interaction
- Increasing independence in daily routines, schoolwork and pre-employment tasks
- Modifying communication to decrease refusal and aggression and to develop more effective expression of needs, knowledge and opinions

Linda explained in detail, with examples how simple visual tools and strategies can address the communication needs and for visual learners.



The webinar was recorded on ASM's <u>facebook livestream</u> for anyone to watch and learn how "the majority of students are visual learners, yet they live in an "auditory" world, they understand what they **SEE** better than what they **HEAR**."

Speech is transient: Message is there and then gone and easily missed.

Visuals are non-transient: Message is present long enough to take in and process information.
